Basic Shop Safety

- Have students write a report on a particular subject in basic shop safety.
 Topics could include eye protection, hearing protection, flammable materials and forklifts.
- Have an official from the local fire department or EMS discuss First Response procedures.
- Choose a chemical and show students how to fill out a MSDS for that chemical. Spend class time reading MSDSs. Have students quiz each other on individual MSDS.
- Appoint students as daily safety monitors on a rotating basis.
- Contact a local safety equipment supply company and arrange to have a lecture and demonstration on personal protective equipment.
- Arrange with school and medical personnel to have a mock accident to which students respond.

Basic Shop Safety

Safety

the condition of being safe from risk or danger

Accidents

leading cause of death and injury for persons one to 37 years of age

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

devices or equipment worn by students, teachers, employees working in a potentially dangerous area

Decibel

a unit for expressing the ratio of two amounts of electric or acoustic signal power equal to 10 times the common logarithm of this ratio

Pinch Points

sharp edges on tools

Ground Fault

large conducting body (as the earth) used as a common return for an electric circuit and as an arbitrary zero of potential

Welding Clothes

clothing with natural fibers such as wool or cotton; should be flame resistant

Safety Glasses

glasses or goggles worn to protect eyes from injury

Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS)

lists cautions, hazards, protection equipment to wear and first aid procedures

Eyewash Fountain

fountain used to flush the eyes when the eyes come in contact with foreign/hazardous material
